

What is cheating?

Cheating is any attempt to gain an unfair advantage in an assessment. At UniSQ, this includes:

- Sharing or accessing past or current assessments without permission
- Communicating with others during quizzes or exams
- Using unauthorised materials, notes, or devices
- Getting help from third-party websites or live chats
- Copying or helping others during assessments
- Impersonating someone or having someone else complete your work

Even small actions like sending a message during a quiz or using hidden notes can be considered cheating.

Why it's serious.

Cheating undermines the integrity of your education and can lead to serious consequences.

How it's detected
