

What is it?

Misrepresentation and falsification occur when you present false, misleading, or incorrect information in your assessment. This includes:

- Making up or altering research data or statistics
- Referencing fake or unrelated sources
- Falsely claiming attendance or participation in required activities
- Giving a false excuse for missing a deadline or claiming to have submitted work

Even if unintentional, these actions can still breach academic integrity.

Ask for ethical help
